

Now Accepting Applications

If you are interested in global issues and want to gain course credit and experience, then you might consider applying for an internship or fellowship at Global Perspectives (GP). The office is offering seven paid fellowship positions and several internship positions for the fall semester. Students from any major can apply; some fellowships even accept applications from other educational institutions.

In addition to research and office assistance, interns and fellows help to facilitate the multiple public events that GP organizes each semester. Every fellowship program awards \$500 for the semester with the exception of the Lawrence J. Chastang Global Fellowship, which provides \$1,000.



Internships require an applicant to have a minimum 3.0 GPA, to be at least a Junior and to submit an application, cover letter and resume by August 1, 2014. Applicants for fellowships must also be a Junior or higher and submit a resume and application, but must also have a minimum 3.5 GPA, two letters of reference, a one-page personal statement, a 5-10 page writing sample and an unofficial transcript. Interns and fellows are expected to have a weekly time commitment of approximately 12 to 15 hours, with 10 hours dedicated to time in the office.

GP in D.C.

In June, GP director John C. Bersia – at the invitation of former U.S. Senator Olympia Snowe – participated in meetings and presentations organized by the Bipartisan Policy Center (BPC) in Washington, D.C. The main event was the launch of the BPC Commission on Political Reform’s new [report](#), “Governing in a Polarized America: A Bipartisan Blueprint to Strengthen our Democracy.” Snowe, along with former U.S. Senators Tom Daschle & Trent Lott, former U.S. Representative Dan Glickman and former Governor Dirk Kempthorne, served as commission co-chairs.



“We all should be concerned about the shortage of civil discourse and the declining ability of the U.S. political system to handle key challenges,” Bersia said. “As the report notes, these problems put the nation’s standing in the world at risk,” he added. Snowe visited UCF in March as the inaugural speaker for the Presidential Distinguished Visitor Series. In October, she will return to UCF with BPC colleagues for a national bipartisan policy forum.
