## Small Countries Outpost

### "An Agricultural Devolution"

Imagine working an hour and a half to be able to buy a large bell pepper.

In the most recent update from the Small Countries Outpost, Lucien and Keane describe what it has been like for them living in a small country that imports 80% of its food. They chronicle how small island developing states (SIDS) have not experienced the "agricultural revolutions" seen in industrialized states, quite the opposite. They identify some of the impediments to high-quality nutrition unique to SIDS, and why these small countries are left with a limited range of low quality, expensive food.

## Talking Trafficking with Indonesian Delegation

Professionals from a variety of Indonesian organizations participated in an International Visitor Leadership Program visit to Orlando in late July. The delegates met with various organizations, including GP and its Human Trafficking Awareness Program. The local schedule of activities was facilitated by the [World Affairs Council of Central Florida](#).



The group represented various sectors that respond to human trafficking. Among professional objectives, delegates sought ways to increase awareness of trafficking, identify and protect victims and expand networks to rehabilitate survivors. The visitors included Citra Arnas, Coordinator of Counseling, Socialization and Campaigns, Embun Pelangi Foundation; Bariyah, Advocacy and Legal Aid Staff, Migrant Care; Tria Budi Rahayu, Division Head, Crime Prevention of Trafficking in Persons of the Interior; Harismen, Executive Producer, Reporter and Anchor, Televisi Republik Indonesia; and Ahmad Muhammad Jahdi, Assistant Director, Immigration Investigation and Compliance, Directorate General of Immigration.

Jessica Squires, GP's Assistant Director, hosted the delegation for a roundtable discussion on promoting awareness of and enhancing cooperation on ending human trafficking. Ted Reynolds, Senior Research Fellow in Terrorism Studies, answered questions about traffickers' use of the internet to find targets and conduct business. Huong Dang, the Francis Bok Human Trafficking Awareness Fellow, shared her research on factors promoting institutionalized sex trafficking in Southeast Asia. Each member of the delegation discussed his or her industry's involvement in human trafficking, obstacles and opportunities. Several GP interns were also there to listen in and ask questions.

Paul Gill, our intern covering East and Southeast Asia, commented, "I now realize that legal systems have to change if we ever hope to be successful at prosecuting domestic and international traffickers."
