What is the Foreign Service?

- U.S. diplomatic corps working in over 270 posts around the world and in U.S. locations
 - Promote peace, security, prosperity, freedom and respect for human dignity
 - Help Americans overseas in times of crisis
 - Promote human rights and combat trafficking in persons
 - Coordinate on security and conflict resolution
 - Manage large embassy communities
 - Promote dialogue, exchanges, and understanding
 - Facilitate international trade and cooperation on environmental issues



Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Program Overview

- Prepares young people for careers in international affairs
- Promotes excellence and diversity in U.S. presence abroad
- Howard University administers the program under a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Department of State
- Two components
 - The Rangel International Affairs **Graduate Fellowship**
 - The Rangel International Affairs Summer Enrichment Program





Charles B. Rangel Summer Enrichment Program (SEP)

• Provides <u>undergraduate</u> students with

- A deeper understanding of current issues and career opportunities in international affairs
- Enhanced appreciation, knowledge, and skills to pursue such careers
- Takes place at Howard University in Washington, DC and includes:
 - Academic courses
 - Site visits
 - Professional skills training
 - Networking with foreign affairs professionals
- Scholars receive tuition, travel, room and board, and a stipend of \$3,200



Eligibility Requirements

- U.S. citizenship
- Cumulative GPA of at least 3.2
- Applicants must be full-time undergraduate students with at least sophomore status



Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Graduate Fellowship



• Up to \$84,000 over two years

- Up to \$24,000 per year for tuition and mandatory fees
- \$18,000 living stipend during academic year
- Up to \$11,000 per year for two internships
- Some graduate programs provide supplemental financial assistance



Eligibility Requirements



- U.S. citizenship
- Cumulative 3.2 GPA on a 4.0 scale
- Planning to enroll in a two-year master's program for Fall 2022
 - Field of study relevant to the U.S. Foreign Service (examples: international affairs, business administration, public administration, management)
 - Graduate school applications are separate from the Rangel Graduate Fellowship application



Orientation

- One-week program in mid-May at Howard University
 - Medical exams and clearances
- Professional development activities
- State Department Visit
- Foreign Service Officer meetings
- Congressional orientation
- Professional development activities and social events throughout the summer







Congressional Internship

- Takes place after orientation and summer before grad school
- Work on Capitol Hill for Member of Congress or committee staff on international affairs issues
- Placements are decided by the Rangel program and in close consultation with Fellows



Obligations

- Medical, security and suitability clearances
- Maintain GPA of 3.2 in graduate school
- Meet State Department Foreign Service entry requirements
- Five-year service obligation



How to Apply



Components of the application include:

- Personal statement
- Statement of financial need
- Two letters of recommendation faculty/instructor and community leader
- Proof of U.S. citizenship
- Student Aid Report (SAR) generated by the FAFSA
- Financial aid award letter or statement from applicant's senior year (if applicable)
- Transcripts from all colleges or universities attended
- GRE/GMAT scores (optional)

• The application and all components must be received by **September 29, 2021.**

DOMESTIC INTERNSHIP

- Takes place between the first and second year of graduate school.
- 10-week internship that takes place at the Department of State headquarters in Washington, DC.
- Fellows work in offices and bureaus throughout the Department.
- Professional development activities and networking events throughout summer.



Payne Graduate Fellowship Program Elements

Award of up to \$96,000 over two years, for tuition, fees, living expenses, summer internships.

- \$22,000 per year for tuition and fees (Some graduate programs provide supplemental financial assistance.)
- \$16,000 per year for living stipend
- Up to \$10,000 per year towards summer internships (including housing and transportation)
 - A 10-week internship on Capitol Hill.
 - A 10-week overseas internship.





Payne Graduate Fellowship Selection Process & Timeline



Review

• Academic background, personal statement, financial need, letters of recommendation, community service and leadership.

Eligibility

- U.S. citizenship
- 3.2 GPA
- Planning to enroll in graduate program Fall 2022



Schedule

September 2021: Application Open <u>Now</u> November 2021: Application Deadline December 2021: Selection of Finalists January 2022: Interviews, Notifications, and Decisions

Contact Us!

Crafting a Competitive Application

- Review **application requirements** to ensure eligibility and prepare to apply.
- Explain in **statement of interest (600 words or less)** motivations for applying and identify background, experiences and skills for a successful Foreign Service Officer.
- Demonstrate **academic ability** and rigor in studies.
- Obtain strong letters of recommendation; monitor arrival.
- Demonstrate the **need for financial assistance** for graduate school.
- Include all relevant extracurricular, community, professional or volunteer experiences; highlight leadership roles.
- List all relevant college, university or professional honors and awards.
- **Proofread** all aspects of your application carefully; submit all application materials on time.
